From the Pastor Rev. Kimberly Berenotto

I love when Easter is the third Sunday in April. Easter falls differently each year – it takes place on the first Sunday following the Paschal Full Moon. The Paschal Moon is the first full moon after the fixed day of the March Equinox (3/21). The way this date has been calculated throughout history is complicated, and the complexity of Easter's date has deep and important ties to when Jewish communities celebrate Passover.

But there's still part of me that wants to say, "Hey, let's always have Easter in April when the weather is warming, and the flowers are blooming!" The first daffodils blooming, those pops of yellow hues, feels like the joy of resurrection! And maybe that's because daffodils seem to bloom everywhere and anywhere.

Sure, many people intentionally plant daffodils in their gardens to sprout as the first blossoms of Spring. But have you noticed daffodils are everywhere? Daffodils are persistent, they take root and grow in places a person likely didn't plant them. I see daffodils blooming in the rocky shoulders of major roads and in the brambles and brush on the outskirts of the woods. Animals may spread seeds and bulbs in their travels and there are some historians that suggest that, particularly in the Appalachian region, the location of daffodils indicate where people first settled or had homesteads. Whether by animal or through history, daffodils take root, stick around, and find ways to bloom.

The daffodils help us answer the questions of what's next after Easter? We've heard the Good News and we've sung our "Alleluias!" How do we keep the bright yellow blooming of resurrection alive? We do it with daffodil-like persistence.

In the letter to the Galatians, Paul writes, "And let us not grow weary of doing good, for in due season we will reap, if we do not give up." Wherever we find ourselves planted this Easter season – whether in a manicured garden, the brambles of the woods, or the side of the road – let us not grow weary of blooming with the Good News.

Leadership Updates



The United Church of Christ was first formed by adopting the proposed constitution in summer of 1961. (Coincidentally, I had just graduated high school, so we've been around for a while!). The Penn Northeast Conference was formed in December of 1962 when several local synods of the Evangelical and Reformed Church and delegates from former the PA Conference of the Congregational Christian Churches jointly adopted the Constitution and Bylaws for the Penn Northeast Conference.

Less than a year later, the Conference had set up four Associations to serve the sprawling geography it served, namely the Susquehanna, Lehigh, East Pennsylvania and Blue Mountain Associations. Each of the four maintained two committees – The Executive Committee to oversee administrative matters, and the Church and Ministry Committee, which supported individuals studying for the ministry, granting ordination and/or licensing to those successful candidates, and supporting them in their chosen ministry positions.

Nearly 20 years later, in spring of 1981, delegates to the annual PNEC Conference meeting voted to empower the Conference to act as an Association, thereby dissolving the previous four associations. This action was taken to streamline, simplify and unify the processes used to in all common functions across the Conference. Now, on the cusp of a vote to combine all four PA conferences, we are the only one that functions as both a Conference and an Association, and the other three have 2-5 associations which have adopted different procedures within each.

If the National Synod vote is affirmative this summer, PNEC will continue to be an Association (with a new name yet to be determined) and it will function as it has (a least for a while) with two exceptions. The new, unified Keystone Conference will oversee much of the Committee on Ministry functions that help students striving to become pastors, going through ordination, and receiving guidance while serving in their called position. Volunteers from the association will provide welcome, collegial support and pastoral care.

A second significant change will be in financial resources. As they always have, OCWM funds will support the budget of the Conference. That means none of this funding will support the association we will become. Knowing this shift was coming was one of the reasons that PNEC established the Friends of the Conference campaign to create a new revenue stream. We will continue to rely on individuals in our area who are able, to provide this support and hope to augment these funds with grant funding. Associations in other parts of the state rely on a per member assessment formula for each church to support their work. Part of the proceeds from sale of the Palmerton building may be available to stay within our association, as well as bequests such as that from the estate of Gwilym T. Williams, which supports the Scholarship Fund, should remain with the association. These issues are still being discussed.

The new Conference will also oversee the search and call efforts of member churches, but, again, will rely on (trained) volunteers to be involved in search committee meetings, etc. The Conference can also be expected to provide training opportunities for clergy and laity, sharing of best practices, and resources. It can also provide specialized support by request in areas like conflict issues, coaching, congregational transition support, etc. And the Conference will be responsible for an Annual Conference meeting.

The Penn Northeast Conference will no longer function in its current form beginning in 2026. Many other things will change, including our relationships with staff since Patty Rehrig, Barbara Jennings, and Bonnie Bates will all retire, and new staff will be positioned to serve our congregations. The office building in Palmerton will have a new owner/purpose and three regional Conference offices will be established. Locations are being determined.


However, the Keystone Conference will still be in relationship with our congregations and pastors. We will also have an Association Board, and it will support our congregations and host an

Association meeting annually. There will continue to be communication, interaction and representation from our association serving on committees, teams and the board of the new conference. And our individual congregations will still have the independence our denomination's constitution and bylaws provide; we can continue to reach out to our surrounding community and neighboring congregations to share our Christian values and the love of Christ in action as we have for over 275 years.

May 2025 Local Mission-Brandywine Food Pantry

Let's reach out and help the food-insecure residents of BHASD by supporting the Brandywine Food Pantry. We will collect non-perishable food, personal care items, household and paper products for the local food pantry from Sunday, May 11, 2025 until Saturday, May 31, 2025. The Brandywine Food Pantry is housed at St. Peter's UCC in Topton.

Did you know that the Brandywine Food Pantry is now under the umbrella of Friend, Inc. Community Services outside of Kutztown? Therefore, our local food pantry is able to purchase a larger variety of non-perishable food and also refrigerated and frozen items from Friend, Inc. (Friend, Inc. buys the majority of the food which they provide in their food pantries, from Helping Harvest of Berks and Schuykill Counties.)

The **Brandywine Food Pantry** is always in need of the Paper products (paper towels, tissues, toilet tissue), Personal care items (body wash, shampoo, soap, toothpaste, individually wrapped toothbrushes, etc.), and cleaning and disinfecting products (dish soap, laundry detergent, etc.).

Please deposit your donations for the Brandywine Food Pantry in the appropriately marked boxes in the sanctuary or in the bell room. If you would rather give a mission offering, please put it in your May mission envelope (dated May 18, 2025) or a plain white envelope (with your name and Brandywine Food Pantry on it) and drop it in the offering basket during our Sunday morning worship service, in the locked offering box in the bell room (open during the week from 6:30 AM - 5:30 PM), or mail it to the church.

Teaching What We Believe





Message from the Treasurer

Included in member giving for missions are \$145 for Our Church's Wider Mission and \$926 for Internal Missions (church steeple repairs, egg hunt) Included in Other income is \$1,983.75 for the cell tower lease fee, \$2,600 for the Learning Center facility use fee, \$734 for the Sight and Sound trip and \$6,170 for the church steeple insurance claim. Included in Building Fund expenses are \$493 for cleaning services, \$978.74 for electric service, \$654 for the monthly heating oil budget payment, \$1,105.12 for water testing and equipment maintenance and \$5,577.25 for the quarterly church insurance package premium.
